# THE HOPE CENTER: OUR RESPONSE TO GOD'S INVITATION

Since 2015 and as God continues to send the nations to Cleveland, **The Hope Center for Refugees and Immigrants** (THC) has been helping refugees move from surviving to thriving. Today, it serves as the only ongoing, faith-based drop-in community center for immigrants and refugees in Northeast Ohio, annually serving more than 2,700 international newcomers who walk through our doors.

#### **FASTFACTS: THE HOPE CENTER**

- **2,700+** served in 2022, a **25%** increase in daily visits.
- Provided **75+** adults with employment help or job placement. Partnered with BHITC's new social enterprise, **Peripeti Home**, to provide refugee women with work.
- **250** people became U.S. citizens thanks to THC's legal staff in 2022. Since THC began offering these services, over **1,450** refugees have become U.S. citizens!
- 128 adult students in English and adult basic education classes; 62% progressed to a higher level of English.
- **60** school students enrolled in enrichment and summer programs, with an additional **90+** participating in soccer camp.
- Host two Christian refugee churches that hold weekly worship services at THC.

## OVERVIEW OF **FLOURISH**

Launched by BHITC in 2022, FLOURISH is a 5-year ministry expansion effort that strives to transform communities through hope, opportunity and faith. The \$6 million campaign will:

- Construct 28 new affordable, supportive housing units in Stockyards to provide support
  to families that increases their economic mobility. Construction to start in 2023.
- Expand BHITC's commitment to supporting its refugee integration programs.
- Open the third location of Common Threads on the near west side, slated for 2025.
- Increase BHITC's capacity for developing faith leaders across our city.

### FLOURISH progress report

### EXPANDING WELCOME AT THE HOPE CENTER

### Creating a Place That Communicate Dignity and Hope

Communities where people are valued and understood help generate greater resilience. That's why over the next four years **FLOURISH** will invest more than \$700,000 in The Hope Center, including \$500,000 for needed staffing and program additions to keep pace with demand for services, and more than \$200,000 to complete the facility's needed renovations.

#### STAFFING AND PROGRAM EXPANSIONS: \$500,000 over the next four years

- THC Senior Manager, a new role, to oversee increasing daily operations and community demand for care and support.
- Expanded Immigration Legal Services team to support refugees through citizenship and family reunification processes.
- A new team of dedicated staff instructors for English and adult basic education.
- Support roles in administration, serving walk-in visitors, etc.

#### FACILITY RENOVATIONS: \$220,000 over the next 12 months

- Gathering Space (former sanctuary) including new HVAC, lighting, flooring and painting, that will allow for overflow classes, community events and future rental income.
- Childrens' Nursery, including the construction of a make believe play village for children, new lighting and wall mural. The nursery currently serves upwards of 30 children and toddlers while parents are in education classes.
- Commercial kitchen installation, which will serve as a test kitchen and future micro-enterprise homebase for future refugee caterers.
- Exterior improvements, including improved lighting, safety cameras, trim painting, etc.
- Restrooms including new fixtures, flooring, lighting and handicapped accessibility.


